ALIA National Simultaneous Storytime 2023

Wednesday 24th May 2023.



National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 23rd successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6.

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TERM 2 — HOMEGROUP LEARNING

ENGLISH

Students will continue to build their phonics and word knowledge. Students' speech and discussion skills are supported through planned opportunities for communication and learning discussions. Students are encouraged to present their ideas and respond to questions in full sentences.

Reading is thinking! - students are encouraged to monitor their thinking while reading/ experiencing or viewing a text. Monitoring our **comprehension** means noticing our thinking as we read. We notice our confusions. We use our background knowledge and recognise when something is new to us, form questions as we read, and consider the inferences we are making. As readers we may pause to consider what we know, what questions we have, rereading a section of the text or revisiting a page to prompt our thinking and make connections within the text. Students respond to literary texts through written form and create their own narratives using exemplar texts to model their writing off.

Students at Nilma will once again take part in National Simultaneous Story Time. Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously across the country. This year the event will take place on Wednesday the 24th of May. This year's book is titled 'The Speedy Sloth', written by Rebecca Young and illustrated by Heath McKenzie.

MATHEMATICS

Students in Foundation to Year 2 will continue to explore place value concepts through counting and the manipulation of concrete materials. Students will be investigating multiplication and division through the use of practical examples that represent and model sharing, and by using repeated addition and arrays. Students will explore and measure using informal units, the volume and capacity of containers. Students will continue to work with two dimensional and three dimensional shapes. They will interpret simple maps and give and follow directions to familiar locations. Students from Years 3 to 6 will continue to solve problems involving the four operations of multiplication, division, addition and subtraction. They will explore unit fractions and locate these on a number line. Students will solve equations involving fractions. Students will use a grid reference system to describe locations and describe routes using landmarks and directional language.

Students will complete a pre-assessment to identify student knowledge and determine their next stage of learning, identifying and developing their own learning goals. Students will work on differentiated tasks to develop the skills to attain their Mathematics learning goals with explicit teaching. In order to motivate and engage our students a range of opportunities will be presented for students to apply their skills through rich learning tasks. Students will participate in discussions to clarify understandings and share their learning. They will continue to utilise the computer program *Essential Assessment* to assess their individual learning needs and access differentiated tasks to consolidate their understanding.

BIOLOGICAL SCIENCE

Students in F-2 will identify and compare the needs of plants, animals and humans as living things and how they change and grow in their environment.

Students in Year 4/3 will learn that living things all have certain characteristics. Students will use these characteristics to differentiate between living and non-living things. They will group plants and animals by their observable features. Students will also explore life cycles and will investigate aspects of life cycles through experiments.

Students in Year 5 and 6 will address the key inquiry question of: How do the structural and behavioural features of living things support survival? Students will examine and understand that living things have structural features and adaptations that help them to survive in their environment. They will analyse how the form of living things enables them to function in their environments and understand that plants and animals have internal and external structures that function to support survival, growth, behaviour, and reproduction.



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TERM 2 — HOMEGROUP LEARNING

Health and Physical Education

This term we are able to offer both T-ball and Volleyball for all students. Students will engage in 4-5 sessions of each sport. In Volleyball students will learn fundamental skills and techniques that they can put into practise in games modified to suit students' skill set. Aussie T-Ball is a modified version of baseball designed to introduce students of all abilities to the game. Students will learn four fundamental skills of baseball; throwing, catching, running and striking, in a safe, fun, non-contact environment. The modified versions of the game ensure students have greater game involvement that builds social, mental and physical development.

A clinic has been organised for Football through a visiting Program run by AFL Primary Play. Coaches will deliver a fun, fast and exciting modified Australian Rules Competition for students to engage with. AFL Victoria will provide a range of opportunities to experience and upskill on all things Australian Rules Football. This incursion is set for Friday the 5th of May.

Visual Arts

Students will explore and experience children's literature and will be invited to respond using art-based forms. Students will; comprehend or interpret a text, connect to characters or events, reflect on themes within texts and consider new events or situations.

These opportunities to make meaning of texts will allow students to make choices that allow them to create and understand messages more fully. Visual Arts responses will have students explore how colour, lines, shapes, drawing, painting, and other elements of art communicate messages to the viewer. A range of mediums will be used and experimented with.

Performing Arts - Excursions

All students will have the opportunity to attend a live performance at the West Gippsland Arts Centre later this term. Red and Green Homegroups will attend the 'Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge' Performance on Wednesday the 14th of June. Buddies / Student Wellbeing

Term 2 in the Respectful Relationships program covers topics of; Positive Coping, Problem Solving and Stress Management. Each homegroup will work through activities related to their levels. Nilma fosters respectful relationships and supports students with developing positive coping strategies.

All students will continue to work with their 'Buddies' on a fortnightly basis. Students build relationships with children from other Homegroups whilst completing activities both inside and out.

Smiling Minds is continued in the classroom building students confidence and wellbeing with opportunities for self reflection and time to practice mindfulness.

Student Diary

It remains essential that students bring their diary with them to school each and every day. Student diaries will be safe keeping their logins and passwords for various online learning platforms. The diary is also an organisational and communication tool between home and school.

MARC LIBRARY NEWS
