learning environment, each home group commenced the Literacy block with Phonics and Word Knowledge, followed by reading and writing with students responding to the text read. Some of our visitors took part in the learning tasks, questions were presented by

some parents providing opportunities for further conversations around the structure of the session and ways students are

supported with their learning. Feedback received was positive, with the open morning allowing parents to observe their child(ren) in their learning environment, noticing their skills as a learner and level of independence.








Reading, writing, illustrating, making, listening and sharing all wonderful things happening in MARC Library in Term 2.

Red Homegroup continue to read animal books, The Terrible Plop was a popular book, the students enjoyed the shared reading and loved using their expression to 'yell' their responses to the bold text.

Green Homegroup have completed their Bob Graham Author Study, students compared 5 books written and illustrated by Bob, they loved his oldest books, published 30 years ago, as much as his new releases. We all agreed that he is a great author and an amazing illustrator.

Blue Homegroup have begun their author study of Leigh Hobbs, students loved learning about the character Old Tom and following Leigh's instructions to draw Old Tom. Students will compare other Leigh Hobb's books over the weeks ahead.

Yellow Homegroup are reading books about significant people, they read about Matt Formston 'Surfing in the Dark', a blind Paralympian cyclist and surfing champion. The students enjoyed learning about Braille and experimented writing and reading in Braille. A.B. 'Banjo' Patterson was an interesting figure to read about, students enjoyed reading Waltzing Matilda and other poems by Banjo.





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Performing Arts

It's an exciting stage for Yellow as we work towards a new stage! Auditions are complete and your kids will now know and start working on their characters. There have been some

great contributions to the script and story from students including adding some new characters including Humpty Dumpty and The Boy Who Cried Wolf. Well done team!



The improvisation skills Blue have been working on are great for performance and the stage but even better for life. Improve focus on building positive, relationships. Listening and responding to each other, offering and accepting theatrical gifts and making your partner look good are skills and activities Blue Group has been working on.

Giggling Green & Radical Red We've started our dance and movement unit which looks at connecting dance actions to create a motif or represent music and story. Last week we explored movement and dance to the different parts of Little Red Riding-Hood. We're also learning how to move as a group with dance activities and choregraphed dances.











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OSHC

OSHC Newsletter May 2023

The past few weeks of the OSHC program have seen the students enjoying lots of indoor hands-on play while the sun is hiding! Students have participated in science experiments like making slime, creating Mother's Day cards using acrylic paints and finger printing, building forts and games with others such as Twister and Uno, and even a Finding Nemo-themed afternoon completing Nemo inspired activities whilst watching the movie. Students have also been patiently waiting for the new playground to open which they have been so excited to use!

The students in the after-school care program have also all been working towards the end of term goal of a 'pancakes and ice cream party'. Students are awarded a token to fill the class goal jar — which they need to fill to the top — whenever they are seen sharing with others, being kind to one another, helping students and staff, and being inclusive during their play time.















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On Friday the 5th of May, students participated in a Positive Start AFL Primary Play clinic run by AFL-trained coaches. AFL Primary Play is a curriculum-linked program that introduces students to Australian Rules Football in FREE 40-minute practical sessions. Students enjoyed learning the correct techniques for handballing, kicking and marking. Students were able to practise their skills in a range of games and activities and a lot of fun was had by all!













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Our Year 5/6 class have been actively engaged in discussions around the text 'Birrung the Secret Friend', delving into the characters and themes to develop their understanding. Students investigate words in the text, create character profiles and share inferences during the reading of the text. Students respond orally and through written entries into their notebooks. To Jackie French.



Dear Diary,

I can't stop shuddering. Barney has just left to get rations. I'm ravenous. I'm lucky enough to even get a tiny rock solid piece of steak the size of my thumb. I must be grateful. I'm too scared to get my own rations. We live in a little shelter that Barney built. It has four walls with a little bit of tin that he found lying around near the bay. I was found by Barney under a rock.

Barney thinks that I don't talk but I don't know how to talk because I never got taught how to speak but I am trying to learn. My hunger has come back a lot worse and I am so thirsty my lips have gone dry. I don't want to complain Barney tries his hardest just to keep me safe.

I can hear footsteps approaching me. I don't know who it is. I hope no one can see me. My whole stomach is rumbling. I feel so bad and I'm as pale as a ghost.

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The night Barney left to get our rations was the night we were found. I Worried as usual. What if he gets caught? What if he gets followed and finds us?! That was one she thought about a lot. I wrapped my arms tighter around my body, feeling the maggots wriggle and worm in my stomach. I shifted slightly with my aching body and slammed my eyes shut as tears rolled down my cheeks. I was good at crying silently, but she never bothers to hide that she has been crying when Barney come's. He already knows that she is sad. Barney was the only person I know; well, I think I had

some type of family but when Barney found me, I couldn't remember anything. Back then she wanted to scream, cry, jump into the ocean and stay there until her body shrivelled away! But she couldn't. She felt like she was stuck. Like plaster had been lathered all over her body trapping her. She felt like that often.

On Monday the 15th of May, students attended a Safety Squad session run by the RACV. Students participated in learning activities that taught the importance of safety in many contexts. Students learnt ways to be safe at home including ways to safely use trampolines, bunk beds and pools at home, as well as the use of seatbelts and booster seats when in the car. Students also engaged in discussions about road safety including driveways and some important things to remember when riding a scooter or bike including wearing bright colours, wearing a correctly fitted helmet and the importance of always being aware of your surroundings.

Students in Blue and Yellow Homegroup created an action plan, listing three things they can do at home to ensure they are being safe. It may be a great idea to discuss these with your child!

It was fantastic to see so many students enjoy this important session.
